

THE USE OF DEIXIS IN THE TEXT OF THE KING CHARLES III'S SPEECH IN THE KING CORONATION

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Abstract: This study analyzes the transcripts of King Charles III's speech. The purpose of this study is to find out what deixis is used in King Charles III's speech. Deixis is a form of language in the form of words and others that function specifically outside of language. In other words a form of language can be said to be deixis if the reference moves or changes according to who is the speaker and also depends on the time and place. So, in other words, deixis are words that do not have fixed reference. The scope of this research is pragmatic. The theory used is based on the theory by Levinson which explains the five deixis. Levinson's theory is used in this study because Levinson explains personal, time, place, social, and discourse deixis types in more detail and comprehensively compared to other theories. This research is qualitative and descriptive method. Data collecting technique is the observation method. This study focuses on data collection, namely written documents in the form of text. The data source for this study is the transcript of King Charles's speech "*Deixis Analysis of King Charles III's Speech In The King Coronation*". To analyze the data of this study, after collecting data from speech transcripts, the data of this study analyzed as follows: first, identify some words or phrases that are included in deixis expression. Second, the classification of predetermined deixis clauses based on criteria. Third, the data analyzed based on Levinson's theory in 1983 which defined the types of deixis, namely: Person Deixis, Place/Spatial Deixis, Time/Temporal Deixis, Social Deixis, and Discourse Deixis. The latter determines the type of Deixis used in King Charles's speech. The validity of qualitative research in this study can be seen by re-checking. There are two methods and techniques for presenting data analysis, namely formal and informal method. This study has 5 types of deixis used. There are 109 utterances using Person Deixis, 3 utterances using Place Deixis, 8 utterances using Time Deixis, 9 utterances using Social Deixis, and 12 utterances using Discourse Deixis.

INTRODUCTION

Language is inseparable from people in everyday life. In work, practice cannot leave the use of language. Language is part of life. People communicate with each other. For this reason, language is said to be a means of communication, either orally or in writing (Zaim, 2014). The use of language can see human identity as a means of communication. The language humans use daily can express a person's social status. This can be proven when someone calls his interlocutor or calling using demonstrative pronouns. Kindly the pragmatics of this demonstrative pronoun is known as deixis.

The language used in King Charles's speech also uses personal pronouns, both first-person pronouns, second person, or third person, who is speaking, with what language, to whom, when, where, and about what. Many readers are confused about understanding the utterances in the text and using the changing participles "I" to "you" because some people do not know the theory of various deixis. Besides that, many speakers or interlocutors do not understand the speaker's meaning. Listeners also do not see the purpose of the speaker.

The role of speech is the delivery of oral explanations to mass groups is a crucial matter, as is the first speech of King Charles after the death of Queen Elizabeth and after he is appointed King, both at that time now and in the future. Those proficient in talking can easily reach the masses and successfully market their ideas well so that others easily accept them. There are many ways that the speaker can convey their ideas to the listener.

Charles is King of England at the age of 73. The name Charles chose as King of England was King Charles III. Charles can choose the official name of this four-syllable name, Charles Phillip Arthur George. In the end, the name chosen was King Charles III. Charles, as Prince of Wales, Charles undertook official duties on behalf of Queen Elizabeth II. He founded the youth charity the Prince's Trust in 1976, sponsors the Prince's Charities, and is a patron, president, or a member of over 400 other charities and organizations. Following the death of Queen Elizabeth II, her eldest son Charles has become King. He will be known as King Charles III, the first Charles to sit on the throne since 1685. King Charles III is King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and king of the sovereign states of the Commonwealth (*King Charles III Biography, Prince, Wife & Age*, 2022)

The use of deixis in a state speech has its meaning. Many deixes are used in the text of King Charles's speech. In King Charles's speech, there is deixis which has the function of packaging language and sentences to make them more effective, and this deixis occurs because of the change of context. If one aspect of the sentence changes due to a shift in context, the word or sentence has a deixis meaning. This deixis appears in a discourse. The previous literature review, then analysis, is based on the use of deixis in King Charles III's Speech Gives First Address After The Death Of Queen Elizabeth II.

METHOD

This study is included in qualitative research. According to Moleong qualitative methods are based on research data in words, phrases, sentences, clauses and discourse obtained. This research uses the analyzed to describe references to words that use the type of deixis in King Charles's speech. In addition, the research data and analysis are more qualitative in nature (Moleong, 2017). The answers to the research problems have well explained in this study, but

this research also uses numbers as supporting information. Descriptive research in this study is to describe the types deixis used in King Charles's speech.

Data sources are divided into two categories, primary data and secondary data. Primary data is data collectors getting data sources directly. While secondary data is that data collectors cannot directly get data sources (Sugiyono, 2015).

This research used primary data, namely transcript of King Charles's speech. The data for this study are especially utterances of King Charles's speech transcript, which include person deixis, place/temporal deixis, time/temporal deixis, social deixis, and discourse deixis. Data collecting techniques are the most important research stage because the main purpose of research is to obtain information (Sugiyono, 2015). This research uses library research. Library research is the collection of library data obtained from various sources of library information related to research objects such as through research abstracts, indexes, reviews, journals and reference books (Sugiyono, 2010).

ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS

In this speech, some words contain Deixis from the five types of Deixis. 109 utterances were found using Person Deixis, 5 utterances using Place Deixis, 8 utterances using Time Deixis, 9 utterances using Social Deixis, and the last 12 utterances found using Discourse Deixis.

After collecting the data, the types of Deixis are classified based on the types of Deixis are classified based on the types of Deixis in King Charles's speech "King Charles III's First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II". This study found the Deixis of Person, Time, Place, Social, And Discourse.

From the table above, we can see which types were used in King Charles III's speech. In the table above, King Charles's speech uses all types of deixis: person deixis, place deixis, time deixis, social deixis and discourse deixis. Person deixis is the most widely used type of deixis by King Charles.

Findings

Based on the analysis in this chapter, it was found that King Charles used all types of Deixis in the speech "King Charles III's First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II" which was conveyed on one of the You Tube channels, in fact almost all of words Deixis. In Person Deixis, King Charles uses 3 types of Person Deixis: First Person Deixis, Second Person Deixis, and Third Person Deixis. The Deixis Person used by King Charles in this speech is "I, Me, My, Myself" in the First Person singular. "We, Us, Our" is used by King Charles in the speech as the First plural person. Then the use of Second Person Deixis by King Charles in this speech includes "You, Your" refers to all You Tube viewers who watched the video showing King Charles's speech. Then the use of Third Person Deixis by King Charles in this speech includes "He, She, Him, Her" referring to someone as the main character in the speech. "They, Their" is Third Person Deixis for plural possessive pronouns. Then "It" refers to things that have been mentioned earlier. King Charles uses Person Deixis in the speech to show the use of personal pronouns in King Charles's speech.

Place Deixis in this speech is the word "Where" as Distal Term Deixis, "Bring and Beside" as a Proximal Term Deixis. The function of using Place Deixis by King

Charles is to indicate the use of distance or location in speech. Time Deixis in this speech is divided into pure deixis and specific time then Time Deixis Verb tense. The words “Today, Now, 70 years, In 1947, Last seventy years, 17 years ago, Weeks time”. Time Deixis refers to information about when that moment occurred. The Time Deixis function used by King Charles is to show the use of time in speeches.

Social Deixis in this speech found the use of the words “Her Majesty, The Queen, The Ducky, Prince of Wales, Prince, Princess”. Social Deixis aims to show the differences in social status that exist between the audience and the people of England and the speaker or King Charles and the people of England and the speaker or King Charles and the people involved in the speech spoken by King Charles. The function of using Social Deixis King Charles shows social status or intimacy relative to the video audience King Charles speech on You Tube Chanel. The last is Discourse Deixis King Charles’s use of the words “It, That, You all, This, My beloved mother”. The function of using Discourse Deixis by King Charles shows that the word has a relationship or relationship with the previous text. This study found Person Deixis with a total of 107 times, Discourse Deixis 12 times, Social Deixis as many as 9 times Time Deixis as many as 8 times, and finally with the lowest total Place Deixis only 7 times.

Persona Deixis

Personal deixis concern the coding of the participants in the speech events in which the utterances are made. The personal category is divided into three: the first person category is the speaker’s own grammar, the second person is the speaker’s reference encoding to one or more addresses. Third person encoded references to person and entities that are not the speaker or receiver (Levinson, 1983).

1. First Person Deixis

First Person Deixis is the speaker’s reference to someone or more involved in a conversation. In speech “King Charles III’s Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II”, King Charles uses First Person Deixis such as “I, Myself, We, Us, Our, My, and Me”.

Data 1 :

Utterance : *I speak to you today with feelings of profound sorrow.*

The word “I” as a subject as the first singular person, in the utterance above refers to the speaker or King Charles.

2. Second Person Deixis

Second Person Deixis is the encoding of a speaker’s reference to one or more receivers. In this speech, King Charles also finds the use of Second Person Deixis such as “You and Your”.

Data 1 :

Utterance : *I speak to **you** today with feelings of profound sorrow.*

The word “You” as the second singular person in the speech above refers to all the people who watched the video of King Charles’s speech on the You Tube channel and other media.

3. Third Person Deixis

Third Person Deixis is encoding reference to persons and entities that are not the speaker or recipient of the speech. The common way participant roles are encoded in language is the pronoun and the associated predicate agreement. In other words, third person deixis refers to a referent who is not identified as the speaker or receiver. In King Charles’s speech there is also the use of the third person deixis in the speech as in “she, He, It, Her, Him, They, Their”.

Place Deixis

Place deixis (Spatial or Place Deixis) is deixis that refers to location according to the speaker in a speech event. For speakers, a location that talking about is relative. All speakers of languages, broadly speaking, differentiate place deixis from proximal deixis (referring to objects far from the speaker). Place deixis also concerns the coding of spatial location relative to the location of the participants in the speech event.

Data 6 :

Utterance: *We also share with so many of you in the United Kingdom, in all the countries **where** The Queen was head of state in the commonwealth and across the world.*

The word “Where” it can also be categorized into distal deixis because it's close by speaker or leading to Queen Elizabeth II. Adverb of place where show that he was the main focus of the speech because of his success become Queen of England.

Time Deixis

Time deixis is usually grammatical with adverbs of time (Now, Yesterday, Then, This Year, etc.), but is mainly used in tenses. The direct words yesterday, today, and tomorrow anticipate a calendar or absolute way of referring to the days concerned. Time deixis words show the time of events relative to the time you speak. From the speech of King Charles III “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II”. The speech also noted that King Charles only used Deixis Time to indicate time only a few times.

Data 1 :

Utterance: *I speak to you **today** with feelings of profound sorrow.*

The word “Today” as a special time of pure deixis in the speech above refers to the day King Charles made a speech on Chanel You Tube to express thanks and condolences for the death of Queen Elizabeth II.

Social Deixis

Social Deixis deals with aspects of sentences that reflect or shape the concrete reality of the social situation in which the speech takes place. Social deixis pays attention to the aspects of sentences that reflect or shape or are determined by the specific reality of the social situation in which the speech take place. Of course many aspects of language use depend on this relationship, but this usage is only relevant to the topic of social deixis as far as grammar goes. Social deixis refers to social social characteristics or distinctions between participants or references in a speech event. In “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II” speech, King Charles is also found to be using Social Deixis in speech.

Data 3:

Utterance: *Throughout her life, Her **Majesty** The Queen, my beloved mother, was an inspiration, an example to me and to all my family.*

The word “Majesty” is used for a person of high rank which refers to Queen Elizabeth II.

Discourse Deixis

Discourse Deixis connecting with the orientation in the text through the writer or speaker, the relationship of the parts of the text with the current utterance or as head of time or past, future or simultaneity. Discourse with repetition or substitution. Cataphora is pointing to something that is mentioned later. Discourse Deixis expression linguistics refers to a particular part of a particular part of a discourse wider place where the occurrence of expressions occurs. Discourse Deixis is differentiated into anaphora and cataphora, which function as a means of cohesion text. The forms used to express the deixis of discourse are words or phrase this, that, the former, the following, the first mentioned, that is, etc.

Data 27:

Utterance: *But, I know **this** important work will go on in the trusted hands of others.*

The word “This” in the speech refers to the new position of King Charles III, who was appointed the King after Queen Elizabeth II's death.

From the table, it can be seen and the total 109 times in Person Deixis there are 3 types of Deixis which are also used with high total by King Charles's speech, Deixis word "I" in First Person Deixis, Deixis word "You" in Second Person Deixis, and Deixis word "It" in the Third Person Deixis.

CONCLUSION

Based on data analysis it can be concluded that King Charles used a lot of deixis, here King Charles discusses more about personal because King Charles talks about his family, namely Queen Elizabeth II. The speech delivered by King Charles was a speech of thanks to all his people and also those who shared their condolences on the death of Queen Elizabeth II, because this speech is personal because of that the most widely used deixis is person deixis along with the types of deixis used in King Charles's speech. In this study finds Person Deixis, Place Deixis, Time Deixis, Social Deixis, and Discourse Deixis. Based on the results of the study, the most used Deixis in King Charles's speech were as follows: Person Deixis was used 109 times, Place Deixis was used 5 times, Time Deixis was used 4 times, Social Deixis was used 9 times, and Discourse Deixis was used 12 times. In King Charles's speech, the most widely used deixis is Personal Deixis which is 109 times. Meanwhile, the type of Deixis that has the lowest usage in King Charles's speech is Deixis Time, which is only 4 times.

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
